Course Overview

An in-depth examination of current research and selected topics in cognitive psychology. Content in any given year depends on the instructor. Course capacity is limited to 20 students and enrolment priority is given to PSY Specialists and Research Specialists. There may be additional prerequisites based on the seminar topic given.

This seminar focuses on the fundamental properties of the visual system that work to build our representation of the visual world. Students will be reading both foundational cornerstone articles, as well as articles that represent the current state of the research field. Topics will broadly include Perception, Visual Attention, and Visual Working Memory. Emphasis will be placed on understanding how the modern articles have incorporated what was learnt from the cornerstone articles. Students will be encouraged to think of the 'next steps' themselves and to propose further research questions and experiments. Prerequisites are PSY 202H1 (or equivalent) and one of PSY 270H1/PSY 270H5/PSYB57H3.

Course Learning Outcomes

There are two main goals for this seminar.

1. To provide an overview of the current state of literature in visual attention and visual working memory.
2. Learning to critically analyse scientific articles and how to generate new research questions and experiments to progress the field

Late/Missed Assignments

There will be penalty of 5% (e.g., 38/40 becomes 33/40) per day for the final essay.
